CHAIR MESSAGE

In 2024, we celebrated Sask Lotteries' 50th anniversary and all the wonderful opportunities provided by this one-of-a-kind fundraiser.

Since 1974, lottery sales in Saskatchewan have been used to provide more than \$1.4 billion to support athletes from the grassroots level to the international stage, connect youth to artistic experiences, help residents experience the beauty of the parks that cover the province and much more.

Founding volunteers Cas Pielak and Joe Kanuka agreed to sign a promissory note to help start a lottery fundraising program. Today, the funding is made possible thanks to a long-standing agreement with the Government of Saskatchewan for Sask Sport to operate Sask Lotteries and to direct proceeds from the sale of lottery products to sport, culture and recreation organizations.

I continue to be grateful for this long-standing and one-of-a-kind fundraiser that provides opportunities for Saskatchewan residents. Another year of impressive sales has contributed to the health of the Sask Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation. This trust fund ensures that there is continued support for the volunteer-led community groups and programming into the future.

Not only was it a special year for Sask Lotteries, but as an amateur sport community, we were recently able to support and cheer on hundreds of Saskatchewan athletes, coaches, officials and volunteers in various multi-sport events.

Between the 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Summer Games in Paris, 37 individuals with ties to Saskatchewan represented the province and Canada on amateur sport's largest stage. That includes 25 athletes, nine coaches and three members of the support staff. Across the two games, Saskatchewan athletes captured five medals, while several others had impressive performances.

There was also excitement in the amateur sport community closer to home. In July, Lloydminster played host to over 2,000 athletes, coaches, officials and support staff for the Saskatchewan Summer Games. Hundreds of athletes gathered for the Tony Cote Games at Lac La Ronge Indian Band in August to join in competition for the biennial multi-sport event.

Congratulations to everyone who participated and worked so hard to make these Games successful.

Like Cas and Joe in the '70s, the strength of Saskatchewan's amateur sport community remains its volunteers. It is the dedication of volunteers that brings these high-quality opportunities to participants of all ages and abilities. In fact, none of the multi-sport games we celebrated could have happened without volunteers! Be sure to thank a volunteer in your community for all that they do.

I look forward to continuing to celebrate all that Sask Lotteries funding will do for communities across the province for the next 50 years.

In closing, it has been an honor to serve as your Board Chair over the past year. I want to personally thank all the Sask Sport employees, volunteer committees and our member organizations for your support.

OUR PROMISE

To enrich Saskatchewan communities

Sask Sport is a volunteer-driven, non-profit organization founded in 1972 that serves the amateur sport community and operates Sask Lotteries — the main fundraiser for sport, culture and recreation.

WHAT WE DO

Federation for amateur sport in Saskatchewan

Sask Sport's membership includes 76 provincial sport and multi-sport organizations and districts. Sask Sport supports these members with programs and services that help a vast network of volunteers deliver sport opportunities to more than 325,000 participants.

Fundraiser for sport, culture and recreation

Sask Sport operates Sask Lotteries through a licensing agreement with the Government of Saskatchewan. Lottery proceeds are allocated to eligible sport, culture and recreation groups though the Sask Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation. Volunteer committees of Sask Sport, SaskCulture and the Saskatchewan Parks and Recreation Association oversee and make funding decisions, as well as ensure accountability and transparency.

Supporting volunteers

Lottery proceeds support more than 330,000 volunteers who provide sport, culture and recreation opportunities to communities in every part of the province. Saskatchewan's volunteer-driven system enriches communities and quality of life by giving all people opportunities to learn, grow and play.

SASK LOTTERIES 50TH ANNIVERSARY



The Sask Lotteries 50th anniversary marketing campaign focused on creating a connection with the Saskatchewan community. The campaign included a vibrant and bold use of existing branding in static, digital and video marketing elements, as well as highlighting key numbers from the last 50 years.













The 50th anniversary campaign ran January 22 to December 31 and delivered an impressive total of **22.9 million impressions** across all digital and social media platforms.

The ads also collectively generated **22,887 link clicks** exceeding projections by 9,400. These results highlight how strongly the creative message resonated with Saskatchewan audiences, effectively driving engagement and celebrating this milestone achievement.

50TH TICKET

For the first time ever, Saskatchewan residents had the opportunity to purchase and play a Scratch & Win lottery ticket that was exclusively available in the province. Two lucky Saskatchewan residents took home the top two \$50,000 prizes.

The **ONLY IN SASK** ticket's bold and captivating design included the icons depicting items related to sport, culture and recreation. The unique icons were created by lifelong Saskatchewan resident and illustrator Brian Kachur in consultation with Sask Lotteries.

The ticket had sales of **\$1.1 million** in less than four months and a 97 per cent sell through rate. It was an unprecedented success in the province.



COMMUNITY GRANT

SASK LOTTERIES COMMUNITY GRANT PROGRAM

The Sask Lotteries Community Grant Program continues to benefit volunteer-led community groups by directly funding impactful programs that enhance the quality of life in communities across Saskatchewan.

This initiative complements the other funding and grant programming delivered by Sask Sport, SaskCulture and the Saskatchewan Parks and Recreation Association and their members. By providing funding at the community level, these grants ensure local priorities are supported and that every corner of the province benefits from lottery proceeds. With this direct funding, community-based organizations are creating opportunities, eliminating barriers and increasing participation.





OLYMPIC AND PARALYMPIC GAMES

History made on the podium

Three of the medals won by Saskatchewan athletes at the Olympics and Paralympics were historic ones.

Diver Rylan Wiens of Pike Lake, partnered with Nathan Zsombor-Murray to earn Canada's first medal in the men's 10-metre synchronized platform event, a bronze, as did Melfort's Julie Kozun with the Canadian women's sitting volleyball team.

Over on the rugby pitch, Waldheim's Carissa Norsten joined the Canadian women's sevens team to claim silver, the country's best-ever finish at the Olympics.

Repeat performance for Shaw

Midale Para cyclist Keely Shaw was back on the Paralympic podium in Paris, winning bronze in the women's C4 3,000-metre individual pursuit — the same medal she earned at the Tokyo 2020 Games.

Backstroking to Bronze

Competing in her second Games, Saskatoon's Shelby Newkirk swam her way to a bronze medal in the women's S6 100-metre backstroke. She just missed the podium in the S6 50-m freestyle, finishing fourth.

First timers shine

Nearly half of the athletes, 12 in total, who attended the 2024 Olympics and Paralympics made their Games debut in Paris. Among them were Humboldt's Paige Crozon and Jacob Wassermann, who both finished fourth in their events.

Crozon and Canada made their first appearance in women's 3x3 basketball, while Wassermann, who competed in the men's PR1 single sculls, was the lone Canadian Para rower.

Three medals at Special Olympics World Games

Regina alpine skiers Taylor Barth and Michael Qing joined Saskatoon snowshoe coach Eric Lautsch and more than 130 other individuals to represent Canada at the Special Olympics World Winter Games in Turin, Italy.

Barth claimed a pair of gold medals, one in the M08 intermediate giant slalom and the other in the M06 intermediate slalom race, while Qing secured second in the M11 intermediate giant slalom and Lautsch guided the Canadian snowshoe team to three golds.



TONY COTE GAMES

Thousands of athletes gathered at Lac La Ronge Indian Band from August 10-16, to join in competition for the biennial multi-sport event.

To mark the commencement of the Games, 10 youth from James Smith Cree Nation – hosts of the 2022 Games – participated in a traditional lance run. The group travelled by foot from Saskatoon to La Ronge, clearing a path for the 2024 athletes in a symbolic gesture as the previous hosts.

The Woodland Team claimed an impressive 100 medals, 44 of which were gold, and finished top of the Games' standings. In addition, the team brought home 32 silver and 24 bronze medals.

Events took place in archery, canoe, golf, soccer, softball, volleyball and athletics, with three different age categories (13U, 15U and 17U).







SASKATCHEWAN SUMMER GAMES

Lloydminster played host to over 2,000 athletes, coaches, officials and support staff for the 2024 Saskatchewan Summer Games.

Athletes from the province's nine districts and 221 communities were welcomed by over 800 local volunteers in the border city, from July 21-27.

Regina's district team finished the weeklong event at the top of medal standings after tallying an outstanding 111 medals becoming the overall champions. They accumulated 28 gold, 29 silver and 54 bronze medals with the highest medal total of 39 claimed in swimming.

MULTICULTURALISM IN SPORT BREAKFAST

The morning following the 40th Annual Saskatchewan Sport Awards, individuals gathered to enjoy breakfast and listen to the conversation that took place at the Multiculturalism in Sport Breakfast. Host Devin Heroux was joined by panelists Ted Jaleta, Amou Madol and Randi Keshane-Chaboyer to discuss the impact of inclusivity in sport.



Ted Jaleta, international distant runner

"Life is so difficult for some of us in the world and the only way that I am here, is because of sport. I use sport to be who I am. When I was growing up in Ethiopia, the national sport was soccer and I wanted to be a soccer star...[but] I wasn't good enough in soccer because I didn't have any shoes, so I was just sitting hoping to get the opportunity to play. My teacher asked me to join cross country instead and that pivotal moment is what changed my life forever."

Amou Madol, dual-sport athlete

"There are so many young Black children that don't get the chances that I have, so I am really grateful to be in this position where I can sit up here and speak to people and share my story and just talk about how sport has influenced me. Sport, no matter where you come from, I feel like it unifies so many people."

"[In high school,] I played softball at the highest level I could play, and there was an incident that happened that changed my trajectory and made me not even want to play...it came from that coach's own perspective and biases of not understanding who I was as an individual and First Nations athlete."







GRANTS AND PROGRAMS

Athlete Assistance Programs

Utilizing the Sask Lotteries Trust Fund, Sask Sport is able to provide financial assistance to athletes at all levels of sport. Among them are the Next Generation Indigenous Athlete Assistant Grant, Future Best program and the Saskatchewan Program for Athletic Excellence.

Next Generation Indigenous Athlete Assistance Grant

Available to Indigenous athletes who have been named to a provincial team or are competing at the national level, the grant provides funding to athletes to cover costs associated with training, travel to competitions and camps, registration and sport-specific equipment.





Future Best

Saskatchewan has a growing pool of athletes with the realistic potential of competing for and earning a spot on a senior national team. To help them achieve their goals, Future Best funds athletes so they can focus on their training and reaching the next level.





Saskatchewan Program for Athletic Excellence

Many athletes who hail from Saskatchewan have advanced to represent Canada on the international stage and have been carded by their respective National Sport Organizations. This program provides an additional top-up in funding to those athletes.





Indigenous Sport Summit

Over 150 sport leaders from Provincial Sport Organizations, Districts, Tribal Councils, Métis Nation-Saskatchewan (MN-S), Federation of Sovereign Indigenous Nations (FSIN) and communities across the province attended the Indigenous Sport Summit from March 5-6 in Saskatoon.

During the two-day event, attendees heard from keynote speakers J.R. Larose and Tyler Latu'ila, as well

as panelists on a variety of topics, all with the goal of boosting Indigenous participation in sport and building relationships between networks.

On the evening of March 5, attendees and community members were invited to participate in a round dance co-hosted by Sask Sport, MN-S and FSIN.


